

## New Directions: An Insider's Look at Native American Collections

### Los Angeles

A tour for President's Circle members of the  
School for Advanced Research

January 22<sup>nd</sup> to 25<sup>th</sup>, 2020



### Overview

Join fellow President's Circle members and SAR President Michael Brown for three days in Los Angeles, home to the largest indigenous populations in the US. Extending out from LA and into the Southern California region, there are 19 federally recognized tribes. We have planned a full day with our hosts at the Autry Museum of the American West, both at its state-of-the-art, soon-to-open storage and conservation facility at the Autry Resources Center in Burbank and at the Museum itself in nearby Griffith Park. We will also visit the nearby Pasadena Museum of History, housed in the Fenyes Mansion, where the family who once lived in this historic home have a number of connections with Santa Fe and SAR. The next day we head to the UCLA / Getty conservation lab, used by researchers as well as graduate students in Archaeological and Ethnographic Conservation, located on the campus of the Getty Villa overlooking the Pacific. In addition to seeing this high-tech lab we will learn from one professor about how SAR Guidelines for Collaboration were developed and are used in teaching and research. We will also see Native American collections at the Fowler Museum at UCLA and learn about the collections of the ancient Americas at Los Angeles County Museum of Art. Our base for three nights is the historic Hotel Normandie, located east of the Miracle Mile and west of downtown.

## Highlights

- Talk by **David Treuer**, author of the best-seller “The Heartbeat of Wounded Knee,” and former SAR Lamon Fellow
- Meet **Maylei Blackwell**, former SAR Anne Ray Fellow and UCLA associate professor, activist, oral historian and author, who will tell about her groundbreaking “Mapping Indigenous LA” project
- Behind-the-scenes tour at the **Autry Resources Center**, expected to open later in 2020, a state-of-the-art storage and conservation facility in a 105,000-square-foot, LEED-certified building with secure, climate-controlled storage rooms, conservation laboratories and a photo studio, as well as a conference room, reading room, curatorial offices and a private ceremonial garden
- Docent-led tour at the **Autry Museum of the American West**, established in 1988 by singer, songwriter, actor and businessman Gene Autry, focusing on its Native American baskets, ceramics, jewelry and textiles interspersed throughout its collections of Western art, firearms, saddles, and Hollywood Western memorabilia – much of it collected by Autry, his friends and other Western film stars
- VIP tour at the **Pasadena Museum of History** which, like SAR, is a beneficiary of the Paloheimo Foundation and includes the mansion owned by Eva Scott Fenyes, her daughter Leonora Scott Muse Curtin, and her granddaughter Leonora Francis Curtin Paloheimo – all of whom have illustrious Santa Fe connections
- Special access to the **conservation and research laboratories at the Getty Villa** to learn how guidelines developed by SAR are being implemented by the UCLA/Getty Program for the conservation of archaeological and ethnographic materials
- Behind-the-scenes tour at UCLA’s **Fowler Museum** of the archaeological collections including from the Rainbow Bridge Monument Valley excavations
- Visit **Los Angeles County Museum of Art** where the director of the Art of the Ancient Americas department will talk about its extensive collection and the museum’s methodology; followed by time on your own to visit current exhibitions open during the museum’s multi-year construction project
- Accompanied by **Michael Brown**, SAR President; **Laura Sullivan**, SAR Director of Development; and **Elysia Poon**, Director of SAR’s Indian Arts Research Center

## Itinerary

Wednesday, January 22<sup>nd</sup>

### ARRIVE LOS ANGELES

Arrive **Los Angeles International Airport (LAX)** independently. To avoid rush-hour traffic, which runs from 3-7 p.m., we suggest arriving after 7 p.m.

Transfer to the hotel independently (*at an additional cost of approximately \$35-70 per vehicle*). Allow 30-45 minutes from Los Angeles International (LAX).

Check-in to **Hotel Normandie**, an historic boutique hotel located in LA's Wilshire District, just east of Miracle Mile and west of downtown. Built by Walker & Eisen in 1926 with an iconic Renaissance Revival façade and interiors in a Spanish colonial revival motif, it has been lovingly restored to preserve a rare piece of LA history.

10:00 a.m. Behind-the-scenes tour at the state-of-the-art **Autry Resources Center** (ARC) in Burbank with **LaLena Lewark**, Vice President of Collections and Conservation (*in the photo below*)

We will begin with an introduction to the facility, followed by a tour of the Archaeology Room, Tribal Consultation Room, Basket Room (*14,000 baskets primarily from the western U.S. including the one shown here*), Ceramics Room and Saddle Room.



Though the ARC is currently closed to in-person research pending its anticipated opening later in 2020, we have been granted special access to this state-of-the-art storage and conservation facility. The adaptive reuse project transformed a line of three vacant industrial buildings into an attractive and user-friendly facility with secure, climate-controlled storage rooms, conservation laboratories and a photo studio, as well as a conference room, reading room, curatorial offices and a private ceremonial garden. This 105,000-square-foot, LEED-certified building will have the technology and equipment essential to properly care for, protect, and preserve the Autry's important cultural assets, including more than 600,000 artifacts, cultural materials, artworks, and library materials.

11:40 a.m. Depart by coach.

11:45 a.m. Lunch nearby at Centanni Trattoria. We will be joined by SAR scholar / fellow **David Treuer**, who will talk about his book, "The Heartbeat of Wounded Knee."

1:15 p.m. Depart by coach.

1:30 p.m. Docent-led tour at the **Autry Museum of the American West** (90 min.).

3:00 p.m. Time for the shop and to view the special exhibition: *Masters of the American West* features paintings and sculptures by 64 contemporary, nationally recognized artists. New artists for the 2019 *Masters* include Eric Bowman, G. Russell Case, and Howard Post, as well as returning artists Nicholas Coleman, Dennis Doheny, and Tim Solliday.

3:30 p.m. Depart by coach from the Autry Museum.

4:00 p.m. Next we will visit a historic home that has a number of Santa Fe connections: the Fenyes Mansion (now the **Pasadena Museum of History**).

The house was built by Dr. Adalbert and Eva Scott Fenyes (1849-1930). She was the mother of Leonora Scott Muse Curtin (1879-1972) and grandmother of Leonora Francis Curtin Paloheimo (1903-1999). Eva first visited New Mexico in the 1880s where she became an enthusiast and supporter of Spanish colonial and Native American art and history, a passion she passed on to her daughter and granddaughter. In 1926 Eva and the two Leonoras built the Acequia Madre House (now the Women's International Study Center) and later, the two Leonoras were founding members of the Spanish Colonial Arts Society and purchased the La Cienega property that became the living-history museum El Rancho de las Golondrinas. Descendants of George and Leonora Paloheimo established the Paloheimo Foundation, which counts among its beneficiaries not only Golondrinas and WISC but also the School for Advanced Research.



While the adobe-style Acequia Madre House in Santa Fe is filled with antique furniture and artworks from the Southwest, the Beaux Arts-style Fenyes Mansion contains original furnishings, family heirlooms and art collection more relevant to the history of Pasadena, including a unique California plein air art collection. Our docent-led tour will focus on the history of the family through the artwork and artifacts in the mansion, along with a bit of Pasadena history.



We will also have the opportunity to see something completely out of the ordinary and unique here in the United States: Also on the two-acre estate is the **Finnish Folk Art Museum**, a redwood structure transformed into a traditional Finnish sauna and guesthouse by George Paloheimo while he was Consul to Finland in 1949. Inside we will see authentic Finnish artifacts representative of a 19<sup>th</sup>-century “tupa,” or farmhouse, on display.

Time allowing, also see the current special exhibition, *Starting Over in Pasadena: 1890-1939*.

*There are over 12,000 artifacts in the object collections. The Museum’s collections contain significant paintings and artifacts relevant to the history of the area. Major collections include the Costume & Textile Collection, the Ernest A. Batchelder Tile Collection, and a mid-century ceramics collection. Objects from the Museum’s collections are regularly on display in our changing exhibitions in the History Center.*

## UCLA/GETTY LAB AT GETTY VILLA & FOWLER MUSEUM

- 9:15 a.m. Meet in the hotel lobby.

The UCLA/Getty Program has implemented guidelines established by SAR for the collaborative conservation of Indigenous materials. We will visit the conservation and research laboratories at the Getty Villa in Malibu with **Ellen Pearlstein**, Professor, UCLA Information Studies and Conservation, who has been a long-time participant in the development of the SAR Guidelines. (allow 40-50 min.)

*The labs are located in a purpose built building where students are able to take classes and do their practical work in two large laboratory spaces. The lab contains various types of equipment used for teaching and research including: several microscopes (stereo, polarized, metallurgical and fluorescence) all with attachments for photomicrography, a light aging chamber; a laboratory oven; a small furnace; a hot stage for microscopy; a freeze-dryer for waterlogged material; equipment for sampling and sample preparation/polishing; a rotary microtome; and an extensive reference collection of organic materials. A photography studio is located here for the imaging and technical examination of art. In addition to digital photography, the lab also contains equipment for specialized examination and photography of art including ultraviolet and infrared filters and a CrimeScope forensic light source. This facility also includes an ancillary classroom, a student workroom with a small library and computers, and an art storage space for the storage and examination of objects and materials. In addition to the facilities available within Getty laboratories, students have supervised access to the x-radiographic equipment at the Getty Villa, allowing for the examination of both small and large-scale objects.*

The Getty Villa offers an Architecture Tour and a Garden Tour (depending on the weather). Both begin at 11:30 a.m., run 40 minutes and are free with your advance, timed ticket to the Getty Villa.:

- **Architecture Tour:** Explore the architecture of the Getty Villa and learn more about daily life in the ancient world in this 40-minute tour.
- **Garden Tour:** Discover the rich mythological and cultural connections of ancient gardens in this 40-minute tour of the Getty Villa's four Roman gardens.

*Talks and tours are free with your advance, timed ticket to the Getty Villa.  
Meet at the Tour Meeting Place across from the Museum Store.*

We will be greeted by **Matthew Robb**, Chief Curator, and **Wendy Teeter**, Curator of Archaeology, before Wendy leads a behind-the-scenes tour of the archaeological collections including from the Rainbow Bridge Monument Valley excavations, during which we will learn how the Fowler supports

research and tribes (*allow 1 hour*). Then have a tour of the collections in the museum.

Then meet SAR fellow **Maylei Blackwell**, UCLA Associate Professor, who will present her *Mapping Indigenous LA* project. Many American Indians, Latin American Indigenous peoples, Alaskan Natives, and Native Hawaiians have come to the rich land of the Gabrieliño/Tongva (present-day Downtown Los Angeles) for a variety of reasons, whether it was from following the rich trade of sea otters, fishing or whaling, or being driven from their homes by the economic tyranny of federal Indian policy, or fleeing persecution of the Mexican government against Indigenous peoples. Many from the Pacific and Global South would follow and make Los Angeles their home. We will learn more about the history of Tongva land and how these communities have made their home in LA. *Professor Maylei Blackwell is an interdisciplinary scholar activist, oral historian, and author of ¡Chicana Power! Contested Histories of Feminism in the Chicano Movement, published with University of Texas Press. Dr. Blackwell has worked with the indigenous social movements in Mexico for over twenty years. For the last ten years, she has conducted community-based and collaborative research with migrant indigenous communities from Mexico and Guatemala who live and work in Los Angeles.*

LACMA is the largest art museum in the western United States, with a collection of nearly 140,000 objects that span the history of art from ancient times to the present. Famed architect Renzo Piano completed an initial transformation of the museum campus in 2008. LACMA has recently broken ground on a four-year construction project in the last phase of its expansion, which should be completed in the end of 2023 when the new Metro station will open across the street. Swiss-born architect Peter Zumthor is the recipient of the 2013 Royal Gold Medal from the Royal Institute of British Architects and the 2009 Pritzker Architecture Prize, among many other international awards.

12:00 p.m. Lunch at Ray's at LACMA. Designed by Renzo Piano, and named in honor of film producer Ray Stark, the restaurant emphasizes gourmet farm-to-table seasonal cuisine overlooking the pavilion and the Urban Light sculpture at LACMA.
